Service Animals:

- Covered under Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) title II and title III in 2010
- Services animals (dogs and miniature horses) are individually trained to do work or perform tasks for people with disabilities.
- Under the ADA, State and local governments, businesses, and nonprofit organizations that serve
 the public generally must allow service animals to accompany people with disabilities in all areas
 of the facility where the public is normally allowed to go.
- Under the ADA, service animals must be harnessed, leashed, or tethered, unless these devices interfere with the service animal's work or the individual's disability prevents using these devices.

Emotional Support Animals:

- Covered under the Fair Housing Act (FHA)
- Any animal that provides emotional support, well-being, or companionship that alleviates the symptoms of disability; not individually trained. Emotional support animals have been proven to help diminish the symptoms of disabilities by providing therapeutic nurture and support.11
- FHA assures reasonable accommodations are made "in rules, policies, practices, or services, when such accommodations may be necessary to afford such person [individual with a disability] equal opportunity to use and enjoy a dwelling."2 "A reasonable accommodation is a change, exception, or adjustment to a rule, policy, practice, or service that may be necessary for a person with a disability . . ."3
- There are definitions on what a dwelling and reasonable accommodations are.
- Person with the disability must show a link between their disability and the task the animal provides. This includes a letter from a professional (doctor, therapist etc.)
- Emotional Support Animals are only permitted in certain areas of the dwelling.

Therapy Animals:

Therapy animals, like those who participate in the Pet Partners Therapy Animal Program, provide affection and comfort to various members of the public, typically in facility settings such as hospitals, assisted living, and schools. These pets have a special aptitude for interacting with members of the public and enjoy doing so. Therapy animal owners volunteer their time to visit with their animal in the community. A therapy animal has no special rights of access, except in those facilities where they are welcomed. They may not enter businesses with "no pets" policies or accompany their handler in the cabin of an airplane regardless of their therapy animal designation. – Pet Partners
